

Internal examinations (Mid – term and Selection Tests) are held on schedule as stipulated by the affiliating University.

Prompt evaluation of answer scripts is ensured in all courses.

Students are allowed access to the evaluated answer scripts which enables them to rectify their mistakes. Grievances , if any, in respect of evaluation are taken care of during this time.



Annexure I

Analysis of feedback from students on curriculum, faculty and infrastructural facilities

Structured questionnaires are given to final year students to obtain their feedback on curriculum, faculty and infrastructural facilities. Students assess individual teachers by filling up a questionnaire especially designed for the purpose. Including a detailed analysis of such feedback on each teacher is beyond the scope of this report. The major observations based on analysis of such feedback are summarised as follows:

- 1. Mode of communication of syllabus by teachers 22% of students reported that the curriculum was communicated by teachers through a combination of 3 methods class room lectures with illustrations, classroom discussions and interactive teaching-learning, audio-visual methods. 37% expressed the opinion that the mode of communication of syllabus was mainly classroom discussions and interactive teaching-learning. 35% said it was manly illustrative classroom lectures.
- 2. **Strict adherence to Curriculum** overwhelming majority of 98% of students affirmed that the curriculum is followed by teachers in strict adherence to University norms.
- Reading materials/ lecture notes provided- 86% of students agreed that teachers provided them with sufficient reading materials/lecture notes as required for the curriculum.
- 4. Academic flexibility of Elective Subjects 37% of students felt that they enjoyed flexibility with regard to choice of elective subjects, 33% felt that such flexibility was limited while 28% of the students felt that their choice of electives was not flexible enough.
- 5. **Internal Assessments** 84% of the students endorsed that they are assessed by the College internally through Mid-Term and Selection Tests in strict adherence to the Curriculum of the affiliating University.
- Enhancement of Skill and Employability 43% of students opined that the Curriculum enabled them to enhance their skills and ensure employability. But 51% of students felt that the same was ensured to a certain extent.
- 7. Supplementation of University Curriculum a large majority of 63% affirmed that the teachers made sincere efforts to supplement the University prescribed

- Curriculum by providing additional learning material, remedial classes, seminar library facility etc.
- 8. Integration of Curriculum with contemporary issues a sizeable majority of 82% affirmed that the College does take initiatives to integrate the Curriculum with relevant contemporary issues and interdisciplinary topics through invited lectures, departmental seminars, UGC-sponsored State level and National Level seminars.
- 9. **Availability of Learning Resources** a significant majority of students (82%) felt that the College library id adequately equipped and endowed with reading resources as per the Curriculum of the affiliating University.
- 10. **Health care, Sanitation, Drinking Water, and Canteen** 35% of students considered these facilities as satisfactory. The provision of drinking water as rated as excellent by 29% of the students.
- 11. Overall Ambience of Classrooms 37% of students considered as satisfactory the overall ambience of classrooms in terms of space, ventilation, sitting arrangements and electrical provisions.
- 12. Career Counselling 38% of students rated the Career Counselling Sessions as good.
- 13. Faculty and Teacher-Student relation 44% of students have rated the teaching faculty of the College as good and 40% of them have rated the same as excellent. The teacher-students relationship has been rated as excellent by 43.5% of students. Students assess individual teachers by filling up a questionnaire especially designed for the purpose. Including a detailed analysis of such feedback on each teacher is beyond the scope of this report.
- 14. Overall Experience a significant proportion (33%) of students have rated their overall experience in this College as excellent.
